Coat of Arms Essay

Crest:

The crest is commonly known as a boiled leather or light wood on a medieval suit of arms, but in this case, it is something else. Here, the crest is located on top of the wreath and is attached to the helmet and it depicts a variety of animals, plants, birds, humans, man-made objects, and, in some cases, parts of one of these items (ie: the wing of a bird). The crest can sometimes be a panache, or plumes or feathers, as well. It would be decorated with natural colors, a repeat of the main color, or even the color of the metal.

For my crest, I chose to use the head of a giraffe. The positive trait this giraffe symbolizes in my Coat of Arms is my perseverance. In my eyes, a giraffe represents the gift for development, improvement, and expansion in one's character. Perseverance begins with understanding that in the goal that you are trying to achieve, there will be obstacles, but no matter how severe the undertaking, sticking it through to the end is the only option. For some Coats of Arms, families didn't have a crown or coronet, or chapeau, so they would replace those items with a wreath. In more common circumstances, the ancient coronet was used instead of a wreath.

For my wreath, I chose to draw silhouettes that represent my lovely friends. And they represent, well, my friends. Each of my friends, wonderful in any and every way imaginable, connects my mantle to my helmet. They remind me that I am Grace Pardini, and no one can change that. Through all of my, well, let's just call them personality traits, each one of my friend are there to explore each and every laugh and sassy comment. They are all there for me. They keep my head screwed on straight. Even though I might be difficult to deal with on my sad days or especially my exhausted days, my friends are always there for me to lean on their shoulders.
